## **PATIENT LEAFLETS**

The NWCSP has five new patient leaflets available to share with patients:

Working together, the NWCSP and Patient Experience Network (PEN) have developed a series of patient resources. These resources have been created for patients by patients through patient-led co-creation activities. PEN facilitated this work to put patients, carers and family members at the centre of shaping and improving wound care. The new leaflets cover a range of topics:

- Loved one in care (pressure sores)
- How to prevent a pressure sore
- I have a leg ulcer why am I being referred to a vascular clinic?
- What is a surgical wound?
- Is my surgical wound healing normally?

## NEW MODULE: DIAGNOSING AND MANAGING WOUND INFECTION

Working with Workforce Training Education (formerly Health Education England), the NWCSP has created a new online wound care module, <u>Diagnosing and Managing Wound Infection</u>, which is now available through the E-learning for Healthcare (Elfh) learning hub. This module aims to provide Tier 2 learners with a thorough understanding of diagnosing and managing wound infection. Two further modules, Assessment and Management of Surgical Wounds and Diagnosing and Managing Surgical Wound Complications are due to be added to complete the suite before the end of March 2025.

These interactive, peer-reviewed modules have been developed to suit different learning styles and are designed to support health and care professionals in caring for people with wounds. <u>Enrol for free today</u> to enhance your wound care knowledge.

#### WOUND CARE EDUCATION FOR GENERAL PRACTICE AND COMMUNITY NURSING

We are delighted to have been part of a working group led by NHS England to develop the Wound Care Educational Resources which support the General Practice Nursing (GPN) Core Career and Capabilities Framework.

The wound care education resource is one of six frameworks developed to support the professional development of general practice and community nursing teams. It has been carefully aligned with published frameworks for general practice, primary care and wider community nursing teams and the National Wound Care Workforce Framework.

This resource identifies the suggested scope of practice for different health professionals and some of the key resources and education programmes available to professionals who care for people with or at risk of wounds. It is designed to be practical and accessible, to enable busy nursing teams to integrate into their daily practice.

The wound care educational resource and other resources supporting the framework are available on the Skills for Health website.
